# JOINT MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Good evening,

On behalf of the Board of Directors and the Executive Director, we are pleased to welcome you to our annual meeting and jointly present the 2022-2023 report. Over the past year, Hearst-Kapuskasing-Smooth Rock Falls Counselling Services has continued its mission to improve the mental health, wellness and safety of its clientele through quality services in both official languages.

Fiscal 2022-2023 was once again a busy year, full of challenges and opportunities related to our mandate and objectives, as shown in our Strategic Plan 2022-2025. The transformation of Ontario's health care system continues with the recent announcement that the government has created the Ontario Health Team for the Cochrane District, which includes health care providers and community care providers throughout the region. The ultimate goal of Ontario Health Teams is to eliminate obstacles and give people better access to care in their communities by attributing a unique identifier to patients and one care plan that follows them everywhere. We continue to remain involved in the process to stay abreast of partnership opportunities and to ensure that the community mental health sector remains a regional priority.

We started fiscal 2022-2023 with excellent news when Women's Shelters Canada approved one-time funding of \$350,000. These funds enabled us to make major renovations to our two women's shelters, Habitat Interlude and the Moosonee Family Resource Centre. Thank you to Thérèse Allard for her leadership and ceaseless efforts on this project that allowed us to significantly improve conditions inside these two buildings.

We also successfully applied for funding through the Ontario government's Anti-Racism Anti-Hate Grant Program. This \$100,000 investment over a two-year period gave rise to the Walking Together on the Path of Healing project. This partnership with the Kapuskasing Indian Friendship Centre and other local partners aims to improve public education, understanding and awareness of Indigenous cultures.

As you know, an organization like ours cannot operate without a finance department that ensures efficient leadership and financial support services for staff members. For reasons beyond our control, our finance department experienced some challenges on a few occasions over the past year. Organizational skills, prioritization of tasks and strong work ethics all played a key role in overcoming last year's difficulties. We would like to recognize and thank Mélanie Bélanger and more recently Nathalie Vachon for their continuous efforts in this department.

Over the last year, we have developed new partnerships to better meet the needs of our clientele. In February 2023, our organization signed a service agreement with Health Sciences North (HSN) and became the 7th service site offering Ontario Structured Psychotherapy Program (OSP) services in Northeastern Ontario. In partnership with HSN, this program offers various service options and assistance to people 18 years of age and over who suffer from depression or light to moderate anxiety-related conditions. We would like to thank Simon Dubosq for his leadership and support in planning and implementing this program.

With the closure of La Maison Arc-en-Ciel residential treatment centre in Opasatika, Ontario Health North East approved annualized base funding for the implementation of a new virtual service for concurrent disorders in the Cochrane District. A partnership was developed between HKS Counselling Services, North Cochrane Addiction Services and the Royal Ottawa Mental Health Centre for communities serviced by our agency. This new virtual service will improve access to specialized services and intensive treatments for young people 16 years of age and over who are experiencing mental health problems and addiction.

We also signed a service agreement of \$75,000 with the Cochrane District Social Services Administration Board (CDSSAB) to become a lead partner in implementing the Cochrane District System of Care. This new regional system will allow our agency to access additional resources to support homeless people who are trying to find and maintain safe and affordable housing. Thank you to Roxanne Lessard, Mélissa Tessier, Joelle Ayotte and Amy Levesque for accepting the responsibilities related to this service.

To conclude, HKS Counselling Services has taken on the responsibility of delivering the Victim Crisis Assistance Ontario (VCAO) program in Smooth Rock Falls and Cochrane. Our team has been servicing these communities since December 2022 when we were asked to temporarily lend a hand. Since this time, VCAO staff has been working in partnership with Ontario Provincial Police officers to support victims of criminal acts and tragic circumstances in the Smooth Rock Falls and Cochrane areas. The Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) officially approved the transfer of funds as of March 1, 2023. Thank you to Michelle Gosselin, Chelsea Mateev, Véronique Fauchon and more recently Tanya Lamarche for your devotion in servicing our clients during this transition period. We would also like to take this opportunity to thank Jody Legros and Jeannette Bélanger from the Ministry for their trust in us and their support during the transition.

On the operations side, mental health program staff served a total of 1,532 individuals and provided over 11,979 clinical activities. In general, statistics continue to show that clients prefer to receive services in person rather than virtually. Approximately 37% of clients are between 20 and 40 years of age, 53% self-identify as women and 63% live in the Kapuskasing area. Psychiatric consultation clinics provided evaluation and follow-up services to 492 clients from communities serviced by our mental health programs, an increase of 6% (30 sessions) compared to the previous year.

Habitat Interlude and Moosonee FRC women's shelters provided housing and support services to 63 women and 48 children, a 7% decrease versus last year. This decrease is explained by the occupation rate that remained very high (81%) throughout the year and underlines the difficulty women face in finding affordable housing in the community. In regards to community programs, we serviced 233 women and children last year, a 50% increase (78 clients) in the communities from Hearst to Cochrane, including Moosonee.

The Victim Services program (VCAO) supported 392 victims and provided over 917 direct contacts, a slight decrease compared to the previous year. Of this total, 81 clients received financial assistance from the VQRP+ Program to cover emergency expenses to meet their immediate needs.

In conclusion, it is important to recognize and thank all members of our team. We would not have achieved the results shown in this report without the dedication of our staff. Their focused attention on delivering quality services and meeting the needs of our clientele is a source of motivation for us all. Once again this year, staff showed a great capacity to face change and new challenges, always with the vision of improving our clients' quality of life.

It is with a great deal of pride that we present this 2022-2023 Report to you.

### **2022-2023 HIGHLIGHTS**

One-time funding of \$350,000 from Women Shelters Canada for renovation projects at Habitat Interlude and Moosonee.

Two (2) days of training with George Couchie on Cultural Mindfulness for all staff members.

- Funding of \$100,000 over two (2) years for the activities of the Anti-Racism and Hate Grant Program.
- 58 educational presentations and several community awareness activities on topics related to our mandate.
- Service agreement with North Cochrane Addiction Services and the Royal Mental Health
   Center to increase access to specialty services and intensive treatment for youth with
   moderate to severe mental health and substance use disorders in the Cochrane District
- Partnership with the Cochrane District Social Services Administration Board (CDSSAB)
   to become a core partner in the new Cochrane District System of Care.
- Significant progress in the office relocation project in Kapuskasing.
- 35 presentations in schools on consent education and online safety (partnership betwee our VCAO program and the OPP).
- HKSCS becomes the 7th Service Delivery Site responsible for the Ontario Structured Psychotherapy of Ontario (OSP) program services in the Northeast region, in partnershi with Health Sciences North.
- Certificate in Indigenous Cultural Competency and Trauma from York University (February/March 2023) for six (6) employees.
- Partnership with CDSSAB in their submission to United Way Centraide Canada for the construction of a safe and affordable housing building in Hearst.
- HKSCS becomes the organization responsible for delivering the VCAO program in the communities of Smooth Rock Falls and Cochrane (March 2023).
- Financing request submission to the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC in the amount of \$2,320,000 + HST and an annualized operating budget for the construction of a transitional house with eight (8) units. in Moosonee.

## HABITAT INTERLUDE / CRF MOOSONEE

HKS Counselling Services (HKSCS) receives annual funding from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS) to ensure effective budget and operations management of the two shelters (Habitat Interlude and the Moosonee FRC).

#### Goals and objectives:

- Provide 24/7 emergency shelter and community support programs for women and their children who are victims or at risk of violence and/or abuse;
- Provide crisis telephone services, including assistance with safety planning, providing information on rights, options and services available, referrals and navigation of the system;
- Provide support in safety planning for women and their dependents who are victims or affected by violence and/or abuse.

### VICTIM CRISIS ASSISTANCE ONTARIO – VCAO

The Victim Crisis Assistance Ontario (VCAO) program provides immediate, short-term support services to victims of crimes and tragic circumstances. The staff provides emotional support, practical assistance and coordination services onsite or by telephone 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



Limited financial assistance is available for victims of violent crimes who require immediate assistance. This program called VQRP+ is designed to bridge the gap between when the crime was committed and when the victim has access to longer-term support services. This program is funded by the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS).




